Canceling Church is something I have done only a couple times in my 30 plus years of ministry. Naming my children was easier than making that final decision to close the church doors. I remember as a child my church awarded pins for perfect attendance. One would attach to the other. Each Rally Day I would head up front to receive the addition to my collection. I remember the Sunday I received my special pin signifying 10 years of perfect attendance. The next time we visited my Grandmother Andrews I proudly showed it off. She smiled, went to her room and returned with her wares. She owned a 50 year pin for perfect attendance and was still counting.

A few years ago my family took a vacation to Utah to ski. The snow was perfect and we had experienced two absolutely wonderful days. But the third day was Sunday. My grown children anxiously awaited to hear the decision concerning the schedule for the days activities. At 6:25 I said, "This is ridiculous. We came to ski, let's ski." At 6:30, 8:30 Eastern time, my cell phone rang. It was my mom. "Louie, I know you are headed to Church so I wanted to call before you left." To this day I don't remember why she called. Obviously she had forgotten we were on vacation. All I know is when I put the phone down my daughter looked at me and said, "We are going to church aren't we?" My son continued, "We checked last night. There is a Lutheran Church just down the hill. Do you think that will work?"

Saturday I watched the predictions. I knew that ice was on the way, an ice that would make travel difficult and an ice that meant many of us could not shovel our cars out until mid-morning. So I picked up the phone and set the cancelation in motion. Members of the First Service Choir had a lot of fun suggesting ways I might celebrate this unexpected day off.

The first thing I did was sleep in until 7:30. That was late for any day and to be honest it felt like I had slept till noon. I looked out side and as predicted the ice had made a mess of all the shoveling I had done the previous day. The tractor had already been by to clear the road creating a barricade between the road and my car. I grabbed my trusty shovel and went to work.

After an hour I went inside to get some caffeine and rest my back. My cell phone rang. My first thought was, "How does Mom know I am not in church?" It was Jim Wright informing me that the Rescue Squad had taken Ralph Frink to UVA. I finished shoveling and headed east. An hour later Pat, Ralph and I were together having church in the Emergency Room, giving thanks to God for Rescue Squads, hospitals and folks that work on Sunday.

"Grandma, if you can hear me, my pin has passed 60 and I'm still counting. Twenty more years and I will pass you."



# Something Completely Different (The Place for Ideas a Little off the Beaten Path)

#### Some Additional Questions About Renovation and Construction

In the last edition of Spreading the Word, Dave Lawson offered a very practical list of questions about the renovations/building additions we are considering. As an old left-brainer, I very much appreciate his perspective. I would like to add a few more questions from my perspective:

What needs of God's people in Nelson County and elsewhere do the renovation and expansion serve? How would this renovation/expansion address Jesus' teaching that Christians are enabled by God's love to...

- Feed the hungry and give drink to those who are thirsty?
- Welcome the stranger?
- Feed the naked?
- Visit the sick and those in prison?

The Presbyterian Online Giving Catalog (https://presbyteriangifts.org/gifts/all/) lists 41 needs of God's people around the world, ranging from Rainwater Catchment Systems (\$75 each) to Community Gardens (\$200 each) to Emergency Life Packs (\$125 each) to Emergency Relief Food Packages (\$85). If we use a mid-range figure from the contractor's estimates for renovation/construction, \$600,000, that comes to:

- 8,000 Rainwater Catchment Systems or
- 3,000 Community Gardens or
- 4,800 Emergency Life Packs or
- 7,060 Emergency Relief Food Packages.

The outreach subcommittee is developing means of reaching others in our community. I think this is best done by having some sense of unmet need...which is unlikely to be met by civic organizations (think biblically – "widows and orphans"). When I asked a non-church member in a demographic (parents of young kids) we want to reach out to, she answered without thinking: "Childcare." If we chose to meet that need, what changes in our physical plant would be required?

The current Building Committee Report listed "Others in the Community" who use our building. Could the Master Gardeners, Square Dancers, Wintergreen Performing Arts, and Rockfish Ruritans not use other facilities – Rockfish Community Center, the fire hall in Afton – leaving us with funds for higher priorities? (The list also includes "Counseling" which, I believe, refers to my seeing local clients at RPC. Thanks, but I'm doing just fine with our current office space.)

If we <u>must</u> do some renovation or construction, may I offer a compromise: Set aside equal amounts of money for RPC renovation/construction and gifts in the Presbyterian Online Giving Catalog or comparable organization to ministering to God's people in need.

- Approved retroactively the Co-Treasurers, Sue Nichols and Roger Fulton for a one year term from 1/1/15 to 12/31/15.
- Approved retroactively the Clerk, Nancy Nevill, for a one year term from 1/1/15 to 12/31/15.
- Louie thanked the Session for their outstanding help in the many requests during December and January for the funerals and other things that took place during that time. He also told the Session about several person's stories.
- Stewardship MT update was given by the Moderator in absence of Elder Borgman.
- There was no old or new business.
