Dad, Dick and the Highway Man

"Have y'all been waiting long?" It was the third time I'd heard Dad say that in the last two minutes. He didn't know I was in the next room. But Dick and the Highway Man knew. They saw me pass by the connecting door that was left open. They knew I used to work with my father, and that I had come to be with him while his colleague Dick told him he was no longer mentally fit for his job.

I stood in my father's law library in downtown Waynesboro, listening to the conversation going on in his office. The same white stool was behind the island of book shelves. I almost sat, remembering the days when the library used to be my office and Dad still ran the law firm he'd started almost 55 years ago, in 1948. But instead, I paced behind it, pulling the damp part of my blouse away from my underarms. "Have y'all been waiting long?" There it was again. My stomach curled, my breath quickened.

Dick and Dad had been Co-Trustees of the Quesenberry Trust for more than 25 years. The 10 a.m. meeting was called by the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) so the Co-Trustees could sign a deed prepared by VDOT's attorney, a cocky, ambitious man who'd been here before. I called him the Highway Man, but not to his face. VDOT was widening Route 250 and taking 18 inches of prime real estate from property owned by the Quesenberry Trust. The taking will narrow its tenant's used car lot, rendering its essential road frontage irrelevant...useless. After the Highway Man left, Dick was going to ask Dad to withdraw as Trustee.

On Monday, Tuesday and again on Wednesday morning I told Dad this was going to happen. "Dad, if you don't withdraw as Trustee, other people will be brought into the picture, like the beneficiaries of the Trust, and that will be more unpleasant. They will write a letter to the judge requesting that you be removed." Each time he glared at me and told me flat-out that he was not going to withdraw.

Dick had called me two days earlier to tell me it was time for Dad to withdraw as Trustee and step-down from his fiduciary duties. Dad was just too forgetful, and Dick worried about liability issues. That was not the first time he'd told me this, but his voice had more conviction this time. The night before, and early that very morning, Dick called again to rehearse what he was going to say to Dad. He told me he was uncomfortable having to say these things to my father. He even asked me to pray for him – but I didn't. I was angry, as if it was God's fault that I was watching my father be rendered as irrelevant and useless as that tenant's remaining road frontage.

Dick was right though. We all knew it. My sisters and I had been trying to persuade Dad to cut back on his work, if not quit all together. But how do you tell your father, whose entire identity is his work, that he should stop working because he's lost his marbles? My sisters were close, but not close enough to bear this kind of witness. I remember asking Dick not to tell Dad a list of things he was doing wrong. I remember asking him to be specific in his feelings but general in his reasons. I remember asking him to please shoot nicely. (I couldn't stand it.)

It took forever for the Highway Man to leave and for Dick to finish going over tax returns and other accounting documents with Dad. I sensed when the meeting was over and walked into Dad's office, reluctantly sitting in the only chair available – his, behind his desk. He and Dick were sitting on the other side. Dad looked up at me and smiled, "Hi Sweetie." I smiled back, "Hi Dad."

Dick's eyes shot me a quick, last plea. I crossed my arms and legs, sighed deeply and put my eyes on the floor. And then he said it, "you know carter due to your medical condition i feel uncomfortable from a liability standpoint with you continuing on as trustee i want you to think about your withdrawing id appreciate your withdrawing because i worry a lot about your forgetting things and theres a liability issue and its time for you to withdraw just think about it but i leave it up to you think about it."

Dad raised his forehead in disbelief, then he composed himself and simply said, "I'll think about it."

Basking Ridge Oak

I am grieving. My family is grieving. We are losing a steady, faithful member of the family. The oak tree is dying.

For 25 years we worshipped at the Basking Ridge Presbyterian Church in New Jersey. We did not need stained glass windows in the sanctuary. We looked out and the frames were filled by the branches of the magnificent oak tree in the churchyard.

The white oak tree is over 600 years old and believed to be the oldest in the country. It was growing before Columbus discovered America. George Washington picnicked under it. The church was established there in 1717. The town grew up calling the tree the Holy Oak for its location next to the church and it became the symbol of the town. Many church members are buried beneath its limbs. Over the years the tree suffered and was carefully tended to. The interior of the trunk was filled with concrete. The huge limbs were supported by steel posts and held up by cables.

And now the tree is dying.

Perhaps you have noticed that we like to sit in a pew on the north side of the sanctuary at Rockfish. This affords me a view of the tree in the churchyard here. It brings me comfort and reminds me of the other tree and of the presence of God in our lives; a presence that is steadfast and protective and comforting.

Soon the church will begin a year long celebration with a community-wide service to celebrate the life of the tree. The wood will be saved and used as fallen branches have been in the past. I am fortunate to have a small figure carved from a piece of the tree.

We will remember the tree fondly and realize that in the cycle of life that we each experience, we bear testimony to the will of God.
