Finding Peace

Having just returned from our two week trip to Germany, Switzerland and Austria, I was reminded how small our world really is. What happens here in the US affects what happens there, and vice versa. All across the world there seems to be a heightened trend towards authoritarianism and it is producing anxiety. So how do we find peace? I was contemplating this and was reminded that during the time of Jesus, Rome was in control. Jesus sought to remind us that there is so much more going on than just politics. When asked if his followers should pay taxes Jesus responded "Then render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's; and to God the things that are God's" (Matthew 22:21 NASB). So what belongs to God? You do. Your soul does. Your essence does. In the midst of all this turbulence that is what we must connect with. Taking time in silence, in meditation, in openness to the Spirit is essential to surviving with integrity the mess all around us. Allowing the Spirit to remind you what is truly important. And it is NOT the politics of the moment. That will change- right, left, center. You can allow yourself to be blown about (much like the boat the disciples were in) or you can connect with your center; Jesus, the Spirit. Allow yourself to settle into His peace, His presence, His will for your life. Spend that 10 minutes, that 20 minutes or even that hour everyday reconnecting. It will soothe your soul and allow you to love and be loved as you were meant to even in the midst of turmoil.

I am sitting on a bus driving from Switzerland to Munich Germany. Travel is such a wonderful way to hear other perspectives and ways of living. All of us know what happened in Germany in the forties. What I found really interesting is that one way their culture is dealing with it is to create localized "memory culture". These memorialized places are not for public or tourist consumption but are for the locals. To remember and therefore not repeat. One example was that a teacher curated a list of all the children who were killed / sent to camps in the war from her particular school in her small town. She painted rocks with each child's name and birth / death date and they line the entrance to the school as a visceral reminder of never again, of what was lost. This is for the inhabitants of that town and no one else. A love offering and a stark reminder.

The news of the attempt on Trump's life and the life lost reached us in Germany. The newspapers here are filled with speculation that our country has lost its footing and fear what that might mean here in Europe. None of us on the bus would argue that the USA seems to be at a crossroads in our democracy. The anger and fear is real and being fanned on all sides. Let us ask- to what purpose?

May our country never succumb to the hate and rhetoric that allowed such horrors as happened here in Europe. May each of us find the wisdom to remember our true identity is not a political party but instead as a child of God. Let us check ourselves and each other when our fear or anger leads us away from the love and non violence that our Lord taught and insisted upon. Who IS your Lord? Who do you serve?

Love your neighbor as yourself.

It really should be simple.

Nelson Enrichment Club Seeking Members & Volunteers

Nellysford, VA – Here to Stay Wintergreen (HSW), a non-profit organization dedicated to helping local seniors age in place, announces the launch, on September 4, of the Nelson Enrichment Club, a social model of respite care for caregivers. Partners include the Rockfish Presbyterian Church (RPC) and the Blue Ridge Medical Center.

Respite care is defined as a short period of relief that supports and strengthens the capacity of family caregivers to provide good care, while ensuring the life of the individual receiving care is enriched. The program's mission is to provide a caring and safe environment for individuals experiencing memory loss and those with Parkinson's. With engaging and enriching activities, members will achieve their fullest potential while providing a restorative break for their dedicated caregivers.

The program will operate on Mondays and Wednesdays from 10am-2pm at the RPC in Nellysford. The daily fee for the Club is \$40. Thanks to the generosity of individuals, churches, and foundations, financial assistance is available as funding allows. Participants will benefit from an assortment of lively activities provided by talented volunteers, such as physical fitness, music therapy, pet therapy, brain games, and arts and crafts. To assist people with dementia, the volunteers will receive specialized training. Member and volunteer recruitment is underway, and applications can be found on the program's website: www.nelsonrespite.org. Please apply in order to receive training at RPC. Dates of training are August 14 and 24 from 1-4 p.m.

The prevalence of dementia increases as the population ages, and the median age of Nelson County is significantly higher than the national average. Most persons with dementia and Parkinson's are cared for at home by someone in their family. Respite care offers periodic breaks for family caregivers, allowing them to attend to their own needs. The idea for the Nelson Enrichment Club emerged from discussions within a monthly caregiver support group sponsored by Here to Stay that is available to all caregivers.

Nelson Enrichment is guided by an Advisory Committee of experts in aging and memory care, ensuring high-quality programming and best practices. About Here to Stay in Wintergreen (HSW): HSW, established in 2019, is dedicated to helping seniors remain safely at home through community support and services. It is a member of the national Village to Village Network, promoting a "seniors helping seniors" model.



We always find "Garden Grows" to be a wonderful retreat and a welcoming place for new friends. As our growing season has progressed we have added two new fellow gardeners. Lisa Shannon and Jennifer Tucker have joined our ranks, lightened the work load and added to our joy. Another, less mobile helper has appeared in our midst. He's been named Bob and his assignment is to ward off birds from chewing into our lovely tomatoes. We told Bob that we would double his pay if he is successful.

Every year we have unwanted creatures. The names change but their aim to eat is always the same. This year it is Japanese beetles and squash borers. We have placed beetle traps in the trees and that has helped immensely. The squash borers do their damage in the squash stems so we are using a deterrent powder of food grade diatomaceous earth (DE). DE is a natural alternative to chemical based pest controls. If you see white powder in the garden, it is an organic substance and not chemical.

In the weeks ahead we look forward to more cucumbers, squash, peppers and tomatoes (if Bob keeps up the good work)! Pull out your recipes for butternut squash. We should have a bumper crop!

Don't leave church on Sundays without getting your vegetables for the week. As a reminder, any and all donations are made to Heifer International at the end of our season.

Moderator Rev. Inger Manchester called the Session Meeting to order at 7:00 pm with prayer. Elder Joe Steele opened with devotion and prayer.

Candidates wishing to join RFP, Rita and Stan Scott, Sandi Winston and Liam Yeatman shared their faith journeys and were welcomed into Active Membership. The right hand of fellowship was offered to all. Liam Yeatman was also approved for Baptism.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Rev. Inger Manchester reported the Board of Nelson Enrichment Center has received approval to open its planned respite center in September. There has been a request by an individual to teach piano lessons here at the church. Under Bronwyn's expansion of the program and the increase in children attending, there was a Motion to approve to overspend the current Education Ministry budget in the amount of \$2,400. APPROVED. There is also interest in starting a new Sunday School class for the parents whose children are attending Children's Sunday School.
