FROM INGER TO CHEW ON - HAPPY SPRINGTIME! LOVE THIS AND HAD TO SHARE!

Matthew 9:15- And Jesus said to them, "Can the wedding guests mourn as long as the bridegroom is with them? The days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them, and then they will fast.

From BEMA- "The ancient Eastern patriarchal culture was a lot different (from today). Arranged marriages were about the entire family group, the entire beit av or the entire mishpucha as we've talked about before. Nevertheless, they would make this pick for you. ...Once that was decided there'd be what would be called the betrothal. The son, the groom would take off with his father to the girl When they arrive at the village, the dad would take a cup out of his pack and he would fill it with wine and he would hand it to the son. The son would take this cup of wine and he would hand it to the potential bride. He would say, "This is the cup of a new covenant that I make with you today. I will not drink of this cup again until I drink it with you in my father's house." Then, he hands her the cup. If she takes the cup and drinks from it, it's her way of covenantally saying, "Yes, I accept your proposal." If she pushes a cup away it's her opportunity to say no.

The groom now leaves to go prepare the house. He goes back to his father's town. They didn't live all independently out on their own. The idea was not to grow up and move out of the house. The idea was to grow up and stay in the house and help your father pursue his vocation, help your father pursue his legacy, and do all that kind of stuff. He now goes back to his father's house and builds an extra room. He would go prepare this room and he doesn't know how long this process is going to take. Only the father knows. This is the dad's last opportunity to teach his son a lesson. He might be really generous and help him even build the extension and help him the whole time. He might make him do all the work on his own.

All the bride knows and all they know is that this groom showed up, he proposed to this girl and then he left. They all know that he's going to prepare the house. One day, the father of the groom is going to walk in and he's going to say, "You know what, I think it's pretty much done. I think we're almost ready. I think it's time."

They're going to take off, the whole family is going to leave to go to the village of the bride. They could show up — depends on how far they have to travel — they could show up literally in the middle of the night. You might even think of the story that Jesus told about the ten bridesmaids and their lamps. Five of them had oil in their lamps and five didn't, and you think, " that's a really weird story."

In the context of ancient Eastern weddings, it's not a weird story at all because once he shows up, the party is going to get started. The ceremony is going to happen and it doesn't matter if you're ready or not. If you're not ready, you're going to be left locked out of the banquet.

Eventually, the bridegroom arrives and I'm sure there would be a shout and the lookout would tell everybody as they see the family coming in the distance. The bride is going to be whisked away to be consecrated.

She'll take a big ritual bath and not just practically to be ready for the ceremony, but spiritually. This is a ritual cleansing. The word consecrate means to "set apart".

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She is setting herself apart for this relationship. She's setting herself apart for this special holy sacred moment. She has consecrated herself and she's prepared. At that point, the shofar is sounded and that's when the ceremony gets started. The bride sometimes will even make an entrance. She comes in being carried on a chair but she'll make the entrance as the shofar is being sounded.

At that point, the couple is going to gather under what's called the chuppah. While they stand under the chuppah, there's going to be the presentation of what's called the ketubah. The ketubah is a covenant and it's been prepared by the groom. It's usually 7, 10, 12 items that the groom is basically saying, "This is the foundation of a relationship. These are the main tenants that I want to build our marriage on." In the ancient world, the bride wasn't a part of making the ketubah, but she did get to accept or reject it. It was another one of those places where she could reject it.

After the ceremony is done, there is the consummation of the wedding and then the party continues (There is so much "wedding talk" in the Bible- both the OT And the NT)

For example- God to Moses to tell the Israelites at Mt Sinai Exodus 19:5–6. *Now, if you obey me fully and keep my covenant, then out of all nations, you will be my treasured possession. Although the whole earth is mine, you will be, for me, a kingdom of priests and a holy nation.*

Now, that phrase in the Hebrew, "my treasured possession," is wedding talk almost exclusively. That's what a groom calls his bride on their wedding day.

Now also consider Jesus' words in John 14. "My father's house has many rooms, if it were not so I would not have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you. If I go to prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am." That's straight-up wedding talk right there. How about this one from Mark 13, "But about that day or hour, no one knows. Not even the angels in heaven, nor the sun, only the father." Talking about His return. He says, "I don't know the hour of my return, only the father knows."

Isn't that soooo neat!! As Easter fast approaches, consider if Jesus is our bridegroom what does that mean about our relationship with God and with Him? Where else do you see marriage talk in the Bible? You are Chosen and Loved.

Balcony Renovation Project

Did you ever have an idle thought while sitting in church, especially if sitting beneath the balcony, of how structurally sound that overhead structure might be? Well, our simple project of replacing carpet revealed an amazing historic structure, but one in need of a little support.

The balcony of our wonderful old church, built in 1854, was the place where slaves sat during the worship service. With their own stairway leading directly up the steps from that left hand door, I can envision the house slaves worshiping their Lord from their own space, separated, but in all ways equal in Gods eye.

When the old carpet was removed, we found what was, in all likelihood, the original floor planks, hammered into the ancient floor joists with square headed nails. The joists are large and wide and solid, but were spaced about 22 inches apart which led to a fair amount of movement in the floor when we walked across. Realizing that this was the time to make sure that the balcony stays put for another 200 years, the decision was made to hire a structural engineer and contractor who would add to the floor joists, firmly tie the front of the overhang to the front of the church, assure that the railing would remain solid by reinforcing with manufactured beams, and replace the subfloor with thick plywood. We were incredibly fortunate to find the team to do this work so quickly, who would respect the historic structure that we have inherited. (thank you Holy Spirit)

Now, with only a three week closure, we have a solid, non creaking, newly carpeted balcony ready to meet the demands of our ever growing little church.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Rev. Inger Manchester reported the following: Jamie Heard suggested an update to the RPC history book from 1999 to present. If there are writers in the congregation who might be interested in this project, contact Jamie. Jamie Heard, Lynne Hess and Rita Scott are working on updating the church directory. Sign-up sheets will soon be available. Due to the increase of membership and parking issues, a change in service times, after Easter, was discussed.
